### A Message about Security from Dr. Mike

I would like to touch on the heightened concern about safety that all school districts are sharing in the wake of recent events both close to home and far away. The Northwest Local School District has many safety and security protocols in place. For the past several years we have been reviewing and strengthening these procedures. Every year, we file a very extensive safety plan with the department of homeland security. Each building has its own plan, and we also have a plan for the entire district. These plans are reviewed on a regular basis. Some of the protocols include but are not limited to:

A full time School Resource Officer for the district **Increased police presence** 

A strong relationship with the county Sheriff and the SWAT team All doors are locked and visitors buzz in to the main office and leave ID All staff members are trained at various levels of security Cameras inside and outside of buildings Several radio systems including a MARCs radio in each building

We are also working with the newly-formed county safety task force formed by the Sheriff, George Maier. Additionally, I have spoken with three different security companies and we will be undergoing a safety audit for our campus with one of those companies.

I am in the process of setting up some opportunities for small groups of parents and other stakeholders to gather and to talk about safety on our campus. Again, I also urge you to talk to your children about safety. Please remind them as well as others that actions or statements that create fear or incite panic, anxiety, or public alarm will not be tolerated verbally or on social media.

The safety and security of students is our top priority. Thank you for allowing us to partner in the education of your young people. We do not take this challenge lightly.
