Curriculum News

K-12 Math Textbook Adoption

During the current academic year, the district is reviewing K-12 math materials with the intent of purchasing new materials for use in the upcoming school year. The materials being considered for adoption will be available in March and April at the Central Office for parents and community members who would like to review them. Please direct any questions or concerns to the Curriculum Department at the Central Office (330) 854-2291.

Gifted Identification and Services Information

While all children have gifts and talents, not all children are considered "gifted." Northwest Local understands the need for educational opportunities for students who demonstrate exceptional cognitive and academic skills. Gifted identification begins as young as kindergarten. Students who qualify for services in grades K-2 have access to enriched curriculum opportunities in reading and math in their general education classroom. Students in third, fourth and fifth grade, who qualify for math services, have access to our gifted math class, and those who qualify for reading services receive enriched curriculum opportunities in their general education classroom. Students in middle school and high school have access to enriched courses, AP courses, and College Credit Plus courses. All students in second through tenth grade participate in whole-grade academic screening. In addition, second and fifth-grade students participate in whole-grade gifted screening in the area of superior cognitive abilities and creative thinking. Parents may refer their child for gifted testing by requesting a referral form from their building administrator and returning the form by May 1, 2022. Third Grade Reading Guarantee Update

Reading is a critical academic skill for all students and the major focus of our K-3 curriculum. Northwest uses the NWEA Measure of Academic Progress (MAP) assessments to monitor the progress of our students. These assessments are administered three times per academic year (fall, winter, and spring). The data gathered from this tool enables our teachers to identify critical areas of need, adjust instructional practices, and provide reading and mathematics interventions as needed.

Governor DeWine signed Senate Bill 229 on December 14, 2021 which contained an emergency clause regarding Ohio's Third Grade Reading Guarantee requirements. School districts are not permitted to retain a student in the third grade based solely on a student's academic performance in reading for the 2021-2022 school year unless the principal and reading teacher, in consultation with the student's parent or guardian, agree the student is reading below grade level and not prepared for fourth grade. The district will notify the parent or guardian of each student who achieves a scaled score below 683 on the spring Ohio State Test for grade three English Language Arts and will identify the various remediation opportunities available to the student to improve the student's academic performance in reading.

While the district ensures that we meet all of the requirements of the Third Grade Reading Guarantee legislation, our main focus is to ensure that our students develop strong reading skills and are able to apply those skills to all academic content areas. Our third-grade students will take the grade three English Language Arts assessment in March, and the results of the spring test will be released by June 30, 2022. **If you have any questions regarding your child's reading progress, please contact their classroom teacher or building principal.**

Since 1977, R.G. Drage Career Technical Center has continued to find innovative ways to connect education with the world of work. Students attending R.G. Drage Career Technical Center gain “real world” career training in addition to academics while graduating from their home school district. Currently, 92 Northwest students are enrolled at R.G. Drage. Programs range from auto collision, machining, building, HVAC/refrigeration, welding, and engineering to sports medicine, health technologies, agriculture, animal science, sports turf & landscape management, graphic communications, and cosmetology. Many students are eligible for job placement during their senior year, often leading to full-time employment after graduation. Students can also take advantage of opportunities to earn college credit while attending R.G. Drage. By taking the necessary college prep courses, students are prepared and encouraged to further their education beyond high school.

Fifth Graders Explore Careers

Stinson is excited to welcome back our fifth-grade Career Day. Career Day began as part of a Comprehensive School Counseling program to aid students with their college and career-related knowledge, skills, and pathways. Guests, many of whom are parents of our fifth-grade students, volunteer their time for a day to interact with students and answer questions about their specific careers.

Prior to the day, students take a career interest inventory and personality assessment. Through a classroom guidance lesson, they are taught that when it comes to choosing a career path, it is important to consider their values, interests, personalities, and skills. The career interest inventory through ODE's Ohio Means Jobs website gives students specific career clusters that are matched with their responses. Using their career day experience, their personality assessment, and their career interest inventory, students complete a slideshow presentation based on a career path of their choice.

Career day is an exciting day for students, providing them with ideas about careers that they may not have ever been introduced to or thought of as an option. Students see first-hand how hard work and being committed to something you are passionate about can lead to a rewarding career. When asked about the benefits of Career day, Mrs. McKendry, the school counselor shares: "I like that this day shows students that college isn't the only avenue to a successful future or career. Many of our guests are entrepreneurs or have started out in a novice position and have worked their way into an experienced position. Students learn about alternative education programs like R.G. Drage Career Technical Center or the military, and other possible avenues that gets them thinking about their future. At this age, when asking a fifth-grader what they want to be when they grow up, most say professional athletes or gamers/YouTubers. While we support and encourage the dreams and goals they have as fifth-graders, it is valuable for them to see what other options might be out there if Plan A doesn't work."

ROX Program for Fifth-Grade Girls

The Stark county Health Department has brought the Ruling Our Experiences (ROX) Program to Stinson Elementary. The mission of ROX is to create generations of confident girls who control their own relationships, experiences, decisions, and futures.

Over the course of several weeks, the ROX program helps fifth-grade girls discover what it means to be a smart, strong, safe, and confident girl! It's led by a ROX facilitator who provides participants with the opportunity to learn how to be the girl who stands up for herself, shuts down the 'drama', and acts as a leader! Through interactive, engaging, and fun activities, girls discuss the big issues going in their lives and develop skills to navigate challenges and find success. Topics covered include: team-building, confidence and self-esteem, assertive communication, social media, healthy friendships & relationships, girl bullying & relational aggression, body image, and verbal and physical self-defense.

When a Stinson participant was asked about the program, she replied, "We've done some really fun team building activities that promote working together. I think I'll learn how to be more confident in myself, and to be kind. If someone is bullying then maybe something is wrong with their life and they need our help." She concluded with, "We should do this every year because it's super fun, and it can help girls that struggle with leadership."

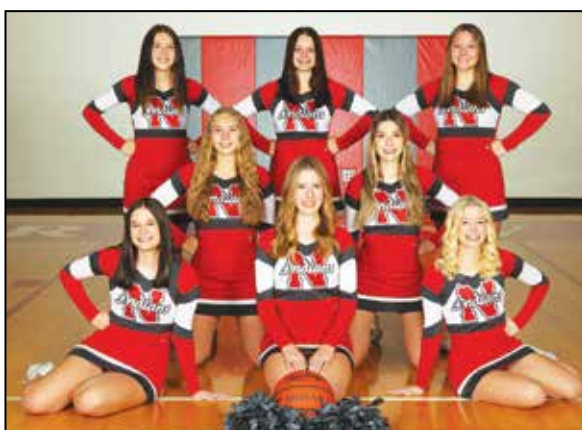

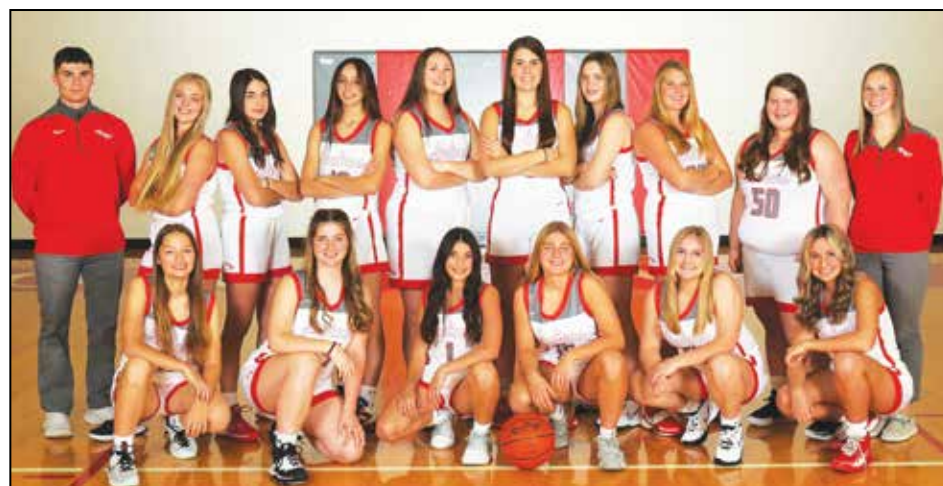

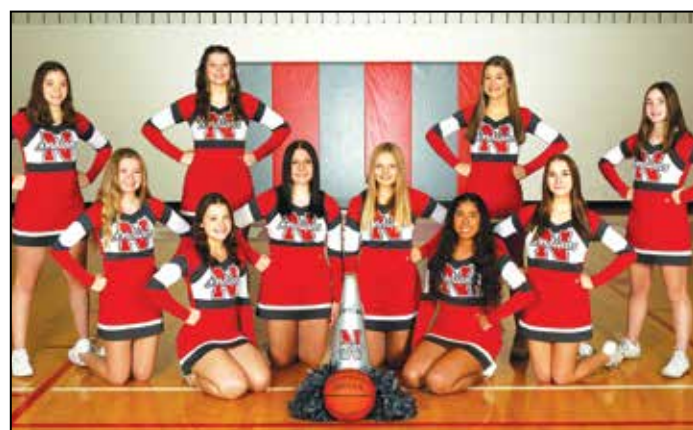
