
to make mistakes, and never forget the people who helped you succeed."

Board of Education Takes Steps to Save on Energy Costs

The Brewer-Garrett Company recently conducted an opportunity analysis to discover potential savings for reduced energy consumption in the Northwest Local School District. The analysis focused on district buildings not included in our recently acquired state dollars for facility renovations. These buildings include the athletic annex, the bus garage, the high school and Northwest Elementary School. Another area for energy savings includes the replacement of district computer monitors and servers.

Our district is aware that new energy technologies are vital because they not only save energy but also save precious operational dollars. Some of the new technologies include High Bay fluorescent technology, LED lighting and energy efficient computers.

The Energy Conservation Program, made possible through House Bill 264 (after the 1985 law that created this financing mechanism), provides zero percent financing to finance energy saving upgrades. Participating in this program assures that all Northwest school facilities are certified at today's highest energy standard.

The benefits of the project are many:

- Savings are guaranteed by the Brewer-Garrett Company (in other words, they cover the cost if savings are not realized).
- The 0% interest loan available if application is received by June 7, 2010.
- Energy savings more than covers the loan for the upgrades.
- New updated energy efficient computers are provided for the district.
- All buildings owned by the school will be upgraded to present day energy standards.
- The program will mean an increased benefit for the Northwest Community at a reduced cost.

Board President Steve Jones states, "This is a fiscally responsible decision for our district." Other districts in Stark County participating in the program include Massillon, Canton Local and Tuslaw.

Fiscally Responsible Bus Routing:

Next year Northwest Local Schools will institute a new bus routing system. This system will dictate new starting and ending times for our school buildings.

Rationale:

The new system will allow us to eliminate three buses from the fleet and save precious operational dollars.

Northwest Local 2-Hour Delay Schedule:

The Northwest Local School District is considering - for <u>some</u> threatening weather days – a two-hour delayed schedule for Northwest High School, Northwest Middle School and W. S. Stinson Elementary with Northwest Elementary operating on its regular schedule.

Rationale:

- A. We could see improved weather and road conditions by 8:50 9:00 a.m. on some threatening weather days and feel that we can save an attendance day by using this schedule. The state has mandated a maximum of three calamity days for school districts beginning with the 2010-2011 school year, therefore, a delayed start will also help to eliminate the need for possible additional make-up days in June.
- B. There is more daylight as our students travel to school on foot, in cars or by school bus. The improved visibility may help to eliminate some potential driving and walking hazards.
- C. This schedule will allow for more clearing or de-icing of the roads before travel to school begins.
- D. While the older students are able to handle a schedule change in the early morning, the late start poses a more difficult problem for parents of K-2 students. Therefore, the starting times for Northwest Elementary will not be subject to a delayed start.

All dismissal times will remain the same.

Facilities Project:

Northwest is entering into a construction project to renovate the Intermediate school, W.S. Stinson Elementary, the middle school and place an addition onto the high school. The project will take approximately two years.

None of the money used to renovate our buildings will come

from our recently passed income tax or from any other local property tax that was passed for operational purposes.

Actually, the funds for these renovations are from the State Of Ohio, specifically from the dollars secured through litigation resulting in a settlement with the tobacco industry. These funds have allowed more than half of the school districts in the state to improve their facilities, and now the children of the Northwest School District will benefit from this opportunity.

Closing of Northwest Intermediate School Effective with the 2010-2011 School Year:

During the construction process, our goal is to minimize student distractions and maximize student safety. To accomplish this goal, we must assign children to classrooms that are different from the areas traditionally used by the grade level or teacher. Because the intermediate building has two floors, we must close that area since noise and safety are challenges during the renovation of a two-story facility. Evacuation of the majority of the building is desirable to minimize any distractions to learning and to assure the safety of our children.

Closing the Intermediate School will mean that we must reassign students to other buildings:

- The fifth grade (this year's fourth grade) will be assigned to Stinson Elementary.
- The sixth grade (this year's fifth grade) will be assigned to Northwest Middle School.

By making these changes as we begin a new school year, students and teachers will benefit from a seamless transition once the actual construction begins. Consolidating instruction into Stinson Elementary and the middle school will also allow us to limit operational expenses in the Intermediate building, thus saving precious operational money.

Once renovations are completed:

- The Intermediate School and W.S. Stinson Elementary will be merged into one building to house grades 3, 4 and 5.
- The middle school will house grades 6, 7 and 8.

Safety will also be a priority at the middle school where plans call for an addition to be built first. During the renovation, parts of the building will be isolated, and students will be moved to other areas until the construction is completed. Plans also include moving the district's administrative offices to the bus garage. The vacated space will be renovated for student use.

New Spring Break Schedule for 2010-2011:

Traditionally, Northwest's spring break begins on Good Friday and runs through the following week. Next year (2010-2011), spring break is the last week of March, March 28-April 1. Please note this is a change from previous years. To view the full school calendar, go to www.northwest.sparcc.org

Rationale:

The Easter holiday is late in April in 2011. Unfortunately, the dates we would typically have spring break conflict with our Ohio Achievement Testing schedule. In order to make sure our students are fully prepared for testing, spring break has been moved to the last week of March.

Northwest in Search of a 2011-2012 Athletic Schedule

Reeling from successive levy defeats and a dire financial situation in April of 2009, Northwest Schools faced possible cancellation of all extracurricular programs. As a member of the Northeastern Buckeye Conference (NBC), the district had no choice but to resign from the league in order to meet the constitutional requirement of a two-year notification of withdrawal from the conference in order to avoid potentially costly penalties. The resignation was accepted by the NBC in May of 2009, and the conference began a search for a school to replace Northwest. In January of 2010, the NBC extended an invitation to Salem City Schools to become the eighth member of the league.

Over the past several months, the dialogue in the community through the coffees and community meetings and the work of the independent finance committee made it clear that extracurricular activities must be maintained for the children of this district. With the passage of the May 4, 2010, earned income tax, Northwest went back to the NBC to request re-admission to the league. The

request was denied at the May meeting of the NBC principals. The Northwest Schools administration is exploring ways to salvage the 2011-2012 athletic season, meeting with administrators, coaches, representatives of booster clubs and parents to discuss the options available to the school district. Gary Woods, Athletic Director, states, "Time is of the essence. Nothing will be done overnight, but we need to start the process and, most importantly, we need to talk with the community. He goes on further to explain, "We must consider travel time, mileage costs, revenue and the impact on the middle school and high school student athletes." As a member of the NBC during the 2009-2010 school year, Northwest athletic teams traveled more than 16,000 miles. Middle school and high school student athletes competed in a total of 619 events.


Having just finished his tenth year as athletic director, Woods says, "Without a doubt, this is the most challenging issue I have faced. My concern is doing right by our student athletes."


