

Welcome to the USA!

Although her home town of Weyhe, Germany is comparatively larger than Canal Fulton, with larger stores, restaurants, theaters, and a marketplace, Madita is impressed with the community spirit and our school spirit: "In Germany, towns are more interconnected, which means you don't have as much pride in your hometown because you've sort of grown up in several towns. For example, not every town has a school and therefore you go to school in the town nearby."

She notes that the German school system is quite different. The school day is much shorter, usually from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., and the schedule differs daily, enabling students to take up to 14 different courses in a semester. Students begin learning English in third grade." Students remain in the same class all day and the teachers move from room to room. Upon completion of elementary school (first through fourth grade), students choose from different high schools, ranging from completion of grade 9 for some jobs to completion of grade 13 for those choosing to go to university.

Madita's mother influenced her decision to become an exchange student: "She did an exchange year in the U.S. when she was my age, and she used to tell me stories about it all the time, which made me want to have this experience as well." Her favorite part of the experience so far? "Definitely the people and the school spirit! Americans are very open and friendly which helps when making friends and settling in. American high schools have a lot of school spirit because of the sport teams, which we don't have in Germany at all."

When she returns to Germany, Madita will go to school for another two years. After graduation, she hopes to do a gap year and volunteer in different parts of the world. She wants to go to University abroad and see as much of Europe as she can! Exchange students Madita Ittmann and Finn Kaufmann.

Finn is from a small town near Cologne, Germany that is really similar to Canal Fulton with the nearest cities located half an hour to an hour away. In comparing Northwest schools to his school in Germany, he feels that the teachers are one of the biggest




differences: "The teachers in America are better to talk to; they seem more like people or friends because they talk about their families and are friendly and personable with students in the class."

One of his favorite things about American schools so far is attending football games and different sporting events that are not typical in Germany. Finn also enjoyed being part of the Northwest soccer team this fall.

Finn has fond memories of traveling to the United States with his family when he was 11 years old. Their travels included New York, Las Vegas, Washington, and more. Like Madita, his decision to become an exchange student was also motivated by family. His sister came to the United States as an exchange student, and he wanted to do the same. While he is in America, this time, he hopes to see Niagara Falls.

When Finn returns home, he will be a sophomore; he will repeat the sophomore year that he spent here, so he will have three more years of schooling. At this point, he is unsure what career path he will choose: "I am not sure about my future plans yet, but I know that being an exchange student is definitely going to help me when it comes to getting a job."

We are happy to welcome Madita and Finn into the Northwest family this year!


