The Canal Fulton Public Library expansion project was scheduled to begin the week of March 30th.

"The expansion will address several needs. Foremost is the need for a program room for educational and recreational library programs. It will also address accessibility issues, and our current insufficient work area for library staff members," said David Brown, Library Director.

The construction is scheduled to be complete in October. Until then, library patrons will need to enter the parking lot from Walnut Street. The parking lot entrance on E. High Street will be closed. The book and A/V materials drop boxes will be relocated in the parking lot for easier access.





This project provides for the construction of a new expansion adjacent to the historic Sullivan house portion of the library. The addition includes 2,266 square feet on the first floor, and 1,039 square feet on the second floor, for a total of 3,305 square feet.

The library has contracted with IAP Government Services Group to manage the building project. IAP then helped the library to select and hire the architect, K2M Design, which did the design work. Johnson Laux Construction will be doing the construction work.

The approximate \$1.3 million project will be funded from money that the Library has set aside for several years, and from a loan. 

Child Find

In an effort to serve young people with disabilities, Northwest Local is continually in the process of locating and evaluating children from 3 to 21 years of age who are suspected as having a disability. Disabilities may include developmental delays, health impairments, autism, and traumatic brain injury.

Individuals may contact the building Principals or Director of Special Services about children suspected as having a disability that may qualify for special education services. Information is available about special education policies and procedures in each building by contacting the building Principal.

Northwest has a child identification process that includes the location, identification and evaluation of a child suspected of having a disability within and outside of district buildings. The Department of Special Services coordinates the child identification process. The Northwest evaluation staff uses a variety of community resources and systematic activities in order to identify children requiring special services. Included in this effort is consultation with appropriate representatives of private school students attending private schools located within the boundaries of the Northwest Local District to carry out this process.

Northwest ensures that this process for students attending private or religious schools located in Northwest Local Schools is comparable to activities undertaken for students with disabilities served in the public school setting.
